Doping - Backdoor Theory since 1999 Advocated by the Doctor and Chairperson of Sports

Have you heard of Mr. Ben Johnson from Canada? He is famous for having cheated by taking performance-enhancing drugs. In 1988, Mr. Johnson ran 100 meters in 9.79 seconds and won the gold medal at the Seoul Olympic Games, but his glory was only momentary. He later tested positive for steroid hormones in a doping test. The world was surprised by this fact and disappointed by his behavior in cheating to win. In the twenty-first century, the Japanese medical doctor's turn has come. The "Doping - Backdoor Theory" has been advocated in Japan since 1999 and is slowly spreading to many top people, including the ambassadors and many four- and five-star hotels in Japan now. A natural result is that the world will have contempt for Japanese backdoor doctors. Their parents use brokers, such as the secretaries of Diet members, for them to pass their entrance examinations. They pay a lot of money to private universities.

I (Dr. Shida) was the team doctor of Japan Table Tennis Team from 1990-1994 and worked in the doping room when the 41st World Table Tennis Championships took place in Chiba Prefecture in Japan in 1991. There are three main reasons why we never admit a doped athlete.

- No.1 Doping drugs are harmful to an athlete's health. There are many doping drugs that have strong side effects.
- **No.2** Doped athletes act contrary to the sporting spirit.
- No.3 Doping drugs are harmful to our society. For example, doping drugs, especially narcotics, are often obtained through a secret deal with a broker, who intervenes between a merchant and the athlete. On the other hand, I gave a short lecture on "Healthcare in the 21st Century" in Tochigi Prefecture in Japan in 1999. There are three main reasons why we never admit a backdoor doctor.
 - No.1 Backdoor doctors are harmful to Japanese health. There are many unintelligent and money-hungry doctors in Japan.
 - No.2 Backdoor doctors act contrary to the examinee's spirit.
 - No.3 Backdoor doctors are harmful to our society. For example, a huge sum of money is often made through a secret deal with a broker, who intervenes between the university and the candidates.

The "Doping - Backdoor Theory" possesses the ultimate concept to combine "Out of Sport, Doped Athlete" and "The Worst Worker, Backdoor Doctor." The world knows that Mr. Ben Johnson has become a bad example of an athlete. He used doping drugs to win the games. Now we know that Japanese backdoor doctors are bad doctors for us because they use a broker to pass the entrance examinations. These are the only reasons why they become backdoor doctors. Other facts have no relationship to backdoor doctors. "Be careful about the graduates and officials of the universities that use entrance examination brokers." The twenty-first century doped athletes and the backdoor doctors will lose their endeavors and their names.

"Academics resign over 'bribe' for Oxford place" (March 25, 2002)

Two academics at the centre of cash-for-places allegations at Oxford University resigned last night. The Rev Dr John Platt and Mary Jane Hilton, both fellows at Pembroke College, are to leave their posts "with immediate effect", the college said in a statement. "Both agreed that they were acting without authority in connection with the matters referred to in *The Sunday Times* and for this reason the resignations which they offered were accepted," the statement continued. An investigation was launched yesterday into reports that an undercover reporter, posing as a wealthy banker, was offered preferential treatment for his son in return for a £300,000 donation. In a covertly recorded interview with *The Sunday Times*, Dr Platt, a senior fellow, is said to have agreed to create an extra place on a law degree course in return for the donation. Dr Platt, the college chaplain, revealed that similar deals had been struck in the past in an attempt to alleviate Pembroke's financial plight.

"Oxford MP calls on Oxbridge to centralise admissions" (March 25, 2002)

In the US it is accepted practice for the children of donors and alumni to receive favourable treatment in the admissions process and this had created expectations among donors in the UK, said Mr Harris (Liberal Democrat MP Evan Harris), who also said he was a personal friend of the Rev John Platt, the student liaison officer at Pembroke, who has resigned. "We need to reduce donor expectations and have a merit-based system," he added, and that making admissions a central university function would separate it from college fundraising. "In small colleges there will always be a temptation and so there will be the perception that this sort of thing goes on," Mr Harris said.

"Even in Japanese economic circles, there is no straightforward talk about the backdoor, money-powered universities. This is an area in which there is a need to draw up some rules."

One day we can get the 'Best 100 Men' to confirm information about brokers and more than 60 million yen in educational expenses in Japan."
